Preparing for KS5 Music

During this transition period, we hope you will consider and prepare for further study in Music. At KS5 Music you may be transitioning to an RSL course or an A Level course. Listen to a wide variety of Music.

Take this opportunity to spend time exploring the full History of Western Classical Music. Once you've covered this, explore the wider genres in Popular Music 1950's onwards. We also recommend looking deeply into Traditional Music styles. We recommend creating a free Spotify account and following or creating playlists that you can revisit. There are also a variety of informative podcasts available, try The Listening Service BBC Radio 3 or Composer of the Week.

Extended Reading. Explore reading lists for A Level Music or Music Technology. Below are some books we can recommend: The Story of Music by Howard Goodhall How Music Works by John Powell Music: A very short introduction by Nicholas Cook Listen to This by Alex Ross

Play your instrument. Performing is a huge part of KS5 music so we challenge you to play for at least 30 minutes everyday. Those taking A Level will want to be looking at Grade 5 and above pieces. Please record your work and send it through to your music teacher for feedback against the specification in advance of beginning your course.

Extended Writing. This could be to focus on a composer, piece or style of music. Why not create your extended writing in a way that suits you: a podcast, a song, a PowerPoint, an essay or a Thinking Map.

Composing. This is hard during lockdown and will depend on what they have at home. Some composition challenges to get you start: Create a Chance composition using dice or a deck of cards, compose a Soundscape using only voices and body percussion, create a full piece but really plan out your key signature/time signature/mood/tempo or why not explore the genre of folk songs and aim to create your own beginning with lyrics that are meaningful to you.

Watching. There are so many free online streaming resources, operas and documentaries out there during this time. You should explore a genre that is new to you, look out for The Shows Must Go On –Andrew Lloyd Webber.

Write a poem or song which summarises the topic we have studied recently. Create a rap which summarises a topic we have studied recently. Haydn's 'trumpet Concert Eb' John Williams 'star wars' Lennon/McCartney 'She Loves You'	Create a chord sequence and then improvise a melody using a Blues scale or a Pentatonic Scale Why not video your work and upload it
Create a revision poster summarising today's lesson/topic we have been studying recently. Use key terms, make it informative and eye catching	Create a poster on a feature of the Western Classical tradition e.g. the Concerto, Sonata Form, Opera, Chamber Music	Write two contrasting chord sequences in the key of C major. They should each be 8 bars long. Type this into Showbie or take a picture of your chord sequence
Create a describing map summarising a lesson/topic we have been studying recently. Use key terms, make it informative and eye catching	Identify 10 key terms we've used in Music so far and write a dictionary. Find the definitions of key words and write a glossary to help you to learn spellings	Write a chord sequence using a mixture of Primary and Secondary Chords. Be sure to write this in a key signature.

Musical Element	Examples of how to show	Convincing	Clear	Just
Rhythm	Syncopation, dotted rhythms, triplets, rubato, tempo change, cross rhythms			
Metre Change of metre, Compound time, Simple time, augmentation, diminution				
Texture	Homophonic, polyphonic, heterophonic, monophonic, melody and accompaniment, canon, antiphonal			
Melody	Scalic, conjunct, disjunct, ornamentation, ostinato, riff, improvisation, blue notes, passing notes			
Structure	Phrases in a structure, ground bass, popular song form, strophic			
Harmony	Cadences – perfect, plagal, imperfect, interrupted, , inversions, extended chords, chromatic harmony			
Tonality	Major tonality, minor tonality, modal tonality, dissonance, pedal, drone			
Timbre	Effects, single instruments chosen, voices – SATB, synthesised sounds, reverb, tremolo, distortion, vibrato, falsetto			
Dynamics	Crescendo, diminuendo, ff, f, mf, mp, p, pp			
Articulation	Legato, staccato. Tenuto, marcato, accent, slurring, arco, pizzicato, tonguing
